The Alabama Disabilities Advocacy Program (ADAP) provides legally-based advocacy services to Alabamians with disabilities to protect, promote, and expand their rights.

Through a program called "Protection and Advocacy for Beneficiaries of Social Security" (PABSS), ADAP advocates and attorneys provide Social Security beneficiaries free assistance

What can ADAP's PABSS program do for you?

Social Security Work Incentives

ADAP can help with Social Security work incentives - special rules that make it possible for people with disabilities receiving Social Security benefits to work and still receive monthly payments and Medicare or Medicaid.

Transition services from school to work

ADAP can help high school students with school-based transition planning so they are ready to go to work or on to higher education opportunities.

Post-Secondary education

ADAP can help post-secondary students with issues like campus physical accessibility, tuition waivers, and classroom and testing accommodations.



ADAP can help youth advocate for community-based and supported employment services.

Housing

ADAP can help youth obtain subsidized housing so they will have money to spend on their return-to-work efforts. ADAP can also help youth get reasonable disability-related housing accommodations.
